Keyboard Shortcuts

Those of our readers who use their computer frequently know that efficiency while at their computer means better productivity. One way to accomplish this is using keyboard shortcuts. Using a key or combination of keys on your keyboard saves stopping and reaching for the mouse each time you want to change a font, open a new window, or put something in bold. Below are some common keyboard shortcuts for Windows, that will save you time and ensure using your PC is more enjoyable.

F1: Help

CTRL+ESC: Open Start menu

ALT+TAB: Switch between open programs

ALT+F4: Quit program

CTRL+C: Copy CTRL+X: Cut CTRL+V: Paste CTRL+Z: Undo CTRL+B: Bold CTRL+U: Underline CTRL+I: Italic

F5: Refreshes the current window. **CTRL+A**: Select all the items in the

current window

CTRL+Left Mouse: Select multiple items

at once

SHIFT+Left Mouse: Select all between

first click and last click

F2: Rename the selected item

SHIFT when you insert a CD-ROM into the CD-ROM drive (Prevent the CD-ROM from automatically playing)

All the shortcuts below relate to using Internet Explorer.

CTRL+E: Open the Search bar
CTRL+F: Start the Find utility
CTRL+H: Open the History bar
CTRL+I: Open the Favorites bar
CTRL+N: Start another instance of the
browser with the same Web address
CTRL+P: Open the Print dialog box
CTRL+R: Update the current Web page
CTRL+W: Close the current window

CTRL+ALT+DEL: Shows end task window if program is not responding

F8: Enters Safe Mode menu when pressed during PC startup

All the above shortcuts will work with Windows 98 through to Windows Vista, although most will also work with Windows 7

Speaking of Windows 7, there are no shortcuts if you forget your profile password. In Windows 98, ME, & XP, if you forgot your password, you could login through the Administrator profile, and reset the password from here. But with Windows 7, if you forget your profile password, it is a time-consuming and expensive process to get around the profile security, not to mention the possibility of losing your data and hard work. If you have a login password for Windows 7, make sure you write it down, and keep it in a safe place.
